# **ASCC** Mission

#### Mission Statement:

The mission of the American Samoa Community College is to foster successful student learning by providing high quality educational programs and services that will enable students to achieve their educational goals and to contribute to the social, cultural, political, economic, technological, and environmental well-being of American Samoa.

To fulfill this mission, the College, as an open admissions, United States accredited, Land Grant institution, provides access to bachelor and associate degrees and certificate programs of study. These programs prepare all students including those who are educationally underserved, challenged, or non-traditional for:

- Successful entry into the workforce;
- Transfer to institutions of higher learning;
- Awareness of the Samoan Culture and the Pacific;
- Research and extension in human and natural resources.

## ASCC 1970 – 2020: 50<sup>th</sup> Year Celebration

- ASCC was established as part of the American Samoa Department of Education in July <u>1970</u>. ASCC was later separated from the Department of Education.
- ASCC relocated to Mapusaga in <u>1974</u>. The College operates from its main campus in Mapusaga.
- In <u>1981</u> the College was designated as a Land Grant Institution. Federal funds were provided to develop programs in agriculture, family and consumer sciences, 4-H youth development, and forestry. A \$3,000,000 endowment fund was given to the College for this establishment and continuance of the Land Grant Institution.
- In <u>1992</u>, under Public Law 22-30, was granted semi-autonomous status within the American Samoa Government. The authority to operate as a degree-granting institution is contained within Public Law 22-30.
- In <u>2004</u>, the ASG Legislature set the Board of Higher Education as having six members of the board appointed by the Governor, the 7<sup>th</sup> member Ex-Officio (Director of Education), and the 8<sup>th</sup> member is a student representative selected by the Student Body of ASCC. In compliance with accreditation standards the Board of Higher Education was given the full authority to select the President of the College, to serve a two-year term.
- The College is accredited by the Accrediting Commission of Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) and <u>in 2013</u>, was granted accreditation by both ACCJC and the Accrediting Commission for Senior Colleges and Universities (ACSCU) for its Bachelor in Education degree in Elementary Education. The College remains accredited since <u>1976</u> under the purview of WASC ACCJC.




