"Since the pageant, I have heard and read so much criticism about me, most of which is irrelevant. I can honestly say, words hurt and sometimes it gets a little difficult for me to perform because when the environment around you fails to work in your favor, you begin to think, what is the point? But, that is exactly the point. It happens as an incentive for you to work harder. I learn to take in all the negative comments and use it as constructive criticism. "I think the possibility of me competing for Miss ASCC would have been high, only because I like stepping out of my comfort zone and trying new things. But, why was this taken out of the school activities? I think this is a great way for our young women of ASCC to express themselves and

Dr. Le'i stated that the Student MPC will "accommodate students, for other reasons along with us (staff), instead of going elsewhere like the Lee Auditorium for graduation. The MPC will include other great features like conference rooms with computers."

Nairy Galemoa, an ASCC student, stated that "I really can't wait to see what the center will offer. I would like to expect that there will not only be a place for students to relax but also a stable tutoring/ work area for the students."

These nifty ideas for the benefit of students and staff will be sure to serve their purpose once the MPC is up and running.





White House Request 1.8 Billion from Congress to Fight Zika Virus

Across many states and U.S. territories the Zika virus has been found resulting in a large request for money to fight against it. Recently, Obama together with the White House has asked the Congress for a total of 1.8 billion dollars to help vulnerable areas in the United States and territories, which includes Guam, Puerto Rico and American Samoa.

The 'Zika virus is an emerging mosquito-borne virus that was first identified in Uganda in 1947 in rhesus monkeys through a monitoring network of sylvatic yellow fever. It was subsequently identified in humans in 1952 in Uganda and the United Republic of Tanzania. Outbreaks of Zika virus disease have been recorded in Africa, the Americas, Asia and the Pacific.'

Some symptons of Dengue and Chikungunya are similar to the Zika virus. Common symptoms of the Zika virus include joint-pain, fever, red eyes and rash. Other symptoms include headache and muscle pain. Although symptoms present in the Zika virus seem harmless, do not be fooled. For pregnant women, it can lead to serious birth defects.

President Obama said in an interview with CBS "There's no need to panic, but the apparent risk factors for pregnant women means the virus has to be taken seriously". The president continues with saying, "The good news is, this is not like Ebola. People don't die of Zika. A lot of people have it but don't even know they have it".

If funding is approved, the money will be used to search for a vaccine, expand mosquito control programs and improve health services for low-income pregnant women. \$1.4 billion will be used within the country alone and the rest totaling an amount of 400 million dollars will be used in other effected countries such as Brazil and territories that include American Samoa.

Because American Samoa has a mosquito population that carries the Zika virus, we should be supporting this bill in order to safeguard our people from this disease. There have already been confirmed cases of the Zika virus in the territory at LBJ Hospital and we should be cautious about creating habitats for the virus to spread, especially in our villages and schools.

In the meantime, while researchers search for a cure, performing the following will help treat the symptoms of Zika: have plenty of rest, take Tylenol for headaches, drinks lots of water, and do not take aspirin or antiinflammatory pills. Here are also a few prevention tips: clean up yard or work area of mosquito breeding trash (tires, ice-cream containers, coconut shells, etc,) cover up with long pants and shirts, and use mosquito repellents containing deet.
